Don't Be Locked Out

Use Your Voice—VOTE!!

In Illinois, you automatically get back your right to vote after you are released from prison or jail. * You just need to register and vote like any other CITIZEN.

How Do I Register to Vote?

Illinois residents may register **in person** at County Clerks' offices, Board of Election Commissioners' offices, city and village offices, township offices, schools, public libraries, military recruitment offices, and other locations specifically designated by the election authority. You can also register **online** or by **mail** (links to online registration and print-out registration forms are available at www.elections.il.gov).

When Can I Register to Vote?

Regular registration is open year-round except during the 27-day period just prior to an election, and during the 2-day period after each election (1 day in Chicago). However, you can also register and vote during the 27-day period through "grace-period" registration, which is available only in person at authorized sites.

Important Dates in 2016

February 17 – first day for "grace-period" registration and voting

March 15 – general primary election

October 12 – first day for "grace-period" registration and voting

November 8 – general election
